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Watershed Action Program 2022 – 2023 School Year Final Report

INTRODUCTION

KIDS for the BAY (KftB) provided the Watershed Action Program (WAP) to two fifth grade classes in the City of El Cerrito during the 2022-2023 school year. This program engaged sixty students, their families, and two partner teachers at Harding Elementary School in El Cerrito. KftB Educator Sakshi Srivastava delivered hands-on environmental science education to students, teachers and families, inspiring them to take action to protect their local watershed. Partner teachers Susan Gonzalez and Richard Lyon were very passionate about learning and teaching this meaningful curriculum.

SUMMARY OF 2022-2023 Environmental Action Projects and field trips

The KIDS for the BAY WAP this year was delivered through engaging, hands-on watershed lessons, an Environmental Action Project, and a bus field trip to a local creek, bay, or delta habitat. In the interactive lessons and Action Projects, students gained important knowledge about their local watershed and how to protect it. They also shared their knowledge with other classes of students, teachers, and family members, and inspired environmental stewardship throughout their school community. The program culminated with a bay field trip to Keller Beach, where students had the special opportunity to investigate organisms on the rocky shore and learn about their adaptations, complete a trash cleanup and create nature art.

The teachers at Harding Elementary were very thankful for the teaching support provided and eager for their students to engage in activities in the classroom and in the outdoors. Partner teachers learned exciting, hands-on approaches to teaching environmental science. Students were excited to become environmentalists by connecting with nature, engaging in scientific experiments, and taking environmental action in their own neighborhood and school community.

CREEK RESTORATION AND WASTE REDUCTION ACTION PROJECTS

Environmental Action Projects provide students and teachers with the opportunity to become leaders in their schools and families, and have a positive impact on the health of their watershed. Ms. Gonzales's class completed the Waste Reduction Action Project. They analyzed waste used in school lunches and hosted a zero waste lunch event. Mr. Lyon's class completed a Creek Restoration Action Project. They focused on biodiversity and erosion and had the opportunity to work with Friends of Five Creeks to help restore Cerrito Creek.

Waste Reduction

To introduce the Waste Reduction Action Project, Ms. Sakshi led a discussion to review how marine plastic pollution is caused by litter pollution traveling through storm drains. The students recalled learning that the preventative measures of the Five Rs (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Rot and Refuse) were preferable to treating pollution after the fact through trash cleanups. When looking at images of landfills students were upset with their size and prominence. Zora shared, "I hope that is not what the whole world looks like in the future!" The class was ready to take action as

2022 – 2023 School Year Report, Stege Sanitary District Page 1 environmental leaders to inform their school community and lessen the individual impacts of waste.

To begin the Action Project, Ms. Sakshi asked students to think deeply about the items that they bring in their lunches or the items that come in their school lunches. Students each got a piece of scrap paper and either wrote down or drew the different items they had in their lunch that day. When they finished, Ms. Sakshi asked students to find out how many pieces of trash the items in their lunch created. "For example, let's think about a juice box or juice pack. How many pieces of trash would that create?" asked Ms. Sakshi. "It would be two pieces of trash-the straw and the juice box," said Colin. Evalyn raised her hand and shared, "Actually there would be one more piece of trash from the straw wrapper. That means there would be three pieces of trash in all." Students eagerly counted to see how much waste their various lunches created. While some students already had a zero- or reduced-waste lunch, others realized that they had more waste than they realized. "My lunch yesterday had a lot of trash. Nine pieces!" shared Thomas. Ms. Sakshi asked students to talk to their partners and discuss one thing they could change about their lunch to create less waste. "I usually bring everything in little plastic bags. I could bring them in a reusable container or bag instead," suggested Charlie. The students pledged to share what they had learned with their families at home, and to help make their own lunches with less 'trashy' and more reusable, zero-waste items.

As a next step, students decided to invite other classes at their school to participate in trash cleanups. They created posters to show students what they can do to create less waste as well as how to sort various forms of waste correctly. Teacher Skye provided the other teachers at Harding Elementary with a sign-up sheet so they could check out the KftB trash cleanup kit for their students. Several other classes at the school conducted a cleanup of their own!

Creek Restoration

To introduce the Creek Restoration Action Project, Ms. Sakshi explained the problem of erosion, and how ecological restoration of watersheds can help alleviate its effects. The students learned basic plant anatomy by using props to dress up their teacher as each part of a plant. After reviewing this information they went outside to play an erosion game. Ms. Sakshi placed two ropes parallel to each other on the ground to represent a creek. She then stationed a few students on the edges of the creek that acted as 'plant roots' that had the ability to capture any 'sediment' that flowed down. The rest of the students ran through the creek pathway, as the 'sediment', to see if they could pass through without being held in place by the surrounding 'plant roots'. The students had so much fun acting as different parts of a creek ecosystem. "Im acting as a native grass, since I know they have long roots to better catch sediment," explained Narumi.

The students in Mr. Lyon's class had the wonderful opportunity to work on a creek restoration project in their local watershed at Cerrito Creek. Ms. Sakshi partnered with Susan Schwartz from the organization, Friends of Five Creeks, to plan this excursion for the fifth graders. On the walk to the creek from Harding Elementary School, Ms. Sakshi provided each pair of students with a guide of the various trees and shrubs they could find along the walk. Students looked closely at leaves, flowers, stems, and bark of the plants to identify them. "I looked for peeling bark on the trunk," Shaun said as he held the plant ID card up to the tree trying to match the leaves.

During Susan's introduction she shared the geology of the high points in the bay including Brooks Island, Point Richmond, and Albany Hill, which could be seen in the distance. She emphasized that the landscape is always changing, now, more than ever. Noah added, "Climate change is causing some areas to get hotter and other areas to get colder."

Betsy and Anne, volunteers with Friends of Five Creeks, shared about the three invasive plants the students would be helping to remove and explained how the students were going to help by eliminating a huge amount of seed from the seed bank along the creek. Students began working by pulling the different weeds. As a class, they collected about 180 gallons of weeds from the creek path. "Wow, this bedstraw is wrapped all around this bush. I wonder if that makes it hard for the bush to keep growing?" pondered Coralily.

Covered in seeds from the bedstraw, Ms. Sakshi asked, "Why would it be useful for these seeds to be sticky?" "They get stuck onto us and then we can't get them off–which might also happen with animals walking through here, then the animal will help to spread the seeds!" said Darrjae. Students helped each other pull off the sticky green balls saying, "We're going to try and leave them all here so we don't spread them around!"

Curious about the shape of the horsetail plants, Shaun asked Susan, "Why do the leaves grow outward in all directions like that?" She responded by explaining that horsetails are ancient plants that were around before trees, and that the growth pattern is an adaptation of not having a defined trunk.

As their final project of the day, students had a chance to plant native grasses by the creek bank where they had pulled out the invasive plants. For many students, it was their first time planting something outside of their school or home gardens, and they were delighted by this opportunity. "I am going to come back here with my family and see how much our grass has grown," exclaimed Kiyo.

This creek restoration project at Cerrito Creek supported students in learning about the local watershed and the diverse plant life along their local creek. They identified various trees and shrubs based on their characteristics and discussed the effects of climate change on the landscape. Through hands-on work, they removed about 180 gallons of invasive weeds, and planted native grass by the creek bank. The experience fostered a sense of environmental stewardship and excitement for the future growth of the restored creek area.

FIELD TRIP TO KELLER BEACH

Fifth grade students from Harding Elementary School in El Cerrito completed their KftB program with a field trip to Keller Beach in Richmond. During the rocky shore investigation, students eagerly explored the area by carefully peeking under rocks to discover the hidden life beneath. Their efforts led to the observation of a diverse range of bay organisms, including small crabs, pile worms, blue mussels, and acorn barnacles. They marveled at their findings! Shawn pointed to a particular seaweed, exclaiming, "We named this seaweed a cow tongue." His observation drew attention to the peculiar shape of the Turkish towel, sparking curiosity among

2022 – 2023 School Year Report, Stege Sanitary District Page 3 his peers. Narumi delightedly shared, "Wow, look at this claw. I can open and close it too." The students' interactions with the organisms deepened their understanding of the San Francisco Bay ecosystem.

Engaging in the adaptations tag game, students eagerly put their knowledge to the test, identifying adaptations in various plants, animals, and insects. They discussed how adaptations enable organisms to survive and thrive in their environments. Matthew confidently remarked, "Adaptations can help animals survive," highlighting the importance of these specialized traits. The game provided an interactive platform for the students to explore the concept of adaptations and apply their understanding to the bay life they studied on their field trip.

A commitment to environmental stewardship was apparent as the students eagerly participated in a beach cleanup. They diligently collected and documented specific pieces of trash they found, including plastic bottles, glass bottles, cigarette butts, and food wrappers, raising awareness about the impact of litter on the delicate rocky shore ecosystem. Zora observed, "I saw that under some rocks the sand is black. I think it's from the refinery. I am really upset because I don't think that is good for the animals living here." Zora's distress reflected the students' growing environmental consciousness and their recognition of the potential negative impact of human activities. Their efforts to remove harmful items from the beach demonstrated their commitment to preserve the ecosystem.

The young environmentalist ended their day at Keller Beach by creating some nature art. They could draw anything that they learned about. She pointed to her drawing of beach hoppers of various sizes under a rock. Shaun closely observed a crab claw that he found and drew a zoomed in, detailed drawing of it.

As students were boarding the bus, teacher Mr. Lyon said, "Thank you so much for coming to our class for this program. I think students got a lot out of it, and so did I. Please keep us in mind for next year if we are eligible to participate!"

Per Government Code Section 66013(d), the District shall make available to the public, within 180 days after the last day of each fiscal year, the following information for that fiscal year:

1. A description of the charges deposited in the fund.

District-Wide Sewer Connection Charge - The purposes of the sewer connection charge are (a) to provide revenue to acquire, construct, install and replace capital facilities and other assets required for the District's wastewater disposal system, and (b) to distribute the cost of acquisition, construction, installation and replacement of the District's wastewater facilities and other capital assets so that the owner of each parcel connected to the District's system pays a proportionate share of those costs. Payment of the applicable connection charge allows discharges of wastewater to be made from the respective parcel in an amount that corresponds to the amount of the charge established by the District Ordinance Code. The discharge capacity thus acquired is irrevocable and runs with the parcel.

San Pablo Avenue Specific Plan Area Sewer Connection/Capacity Charge - In September 2017, a special study was completed to help plan for future developments in the San Pablo Avenue Specific Plan Area (SPASPA) in the City of El Cerrito. ("Sewer Capacity Charge for the San Pablo Avenue Specific Plan Area," September 12, 2017, Urban Economics) and an additional updated connection fee study was conducted in April 2019 ("Connection Charge and SPASPA Impact Fee Study"). Without pipe upsizing, the anticipated development in the SPASPA would surcharge existing facilities. An additional capacity charge will fund sewer capacity improvements needed to serve projected growth within the SPASPA. For new connections and increased discharges in the SPASPA, both residential and nonresidential developments will pay an additional fee per fixture unit. For SPASPA developments, these charges must be paid in addition to the District-Wide Sewer Connection Charge.

- 2. The beginning and ending balance of the fund and the interest earned from investment of moneys in the fund.
- 3. The amount of charges collected in that fiscal year.

EXHIBIT A

Fifth Amendment to Agreement For Legal Services

This is the Sixth Amendment to the Agreement between Stege Sanitary District ("Stege") and Meyers Nave, a Professional Corporation ("Firm"), dated January 9, 2004, as amended October 26, 2007, January 1, 2012, July 24, 2014, June 28, 2018, and August 19, 2021.

Section 4. <u>Compensation</u>, shall be amended as follows:

"Stege shall compensate Firm in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Agreement in the following amounts:

a. <u>Meeting Retainer</u>. A retainer of Two Thousand Eighty Dollars (\$2,080) per month for performance of services directly related to one regular Board meeting each month, specifically including: preparation for the meeting, review of agenda materials for the meeting; drafting of resolutions; consulting with the Manager/Engineer regarding agenda materials; attendance at the meeting; and any follow-up consultations or minor work resulting directly from the meeting.

b. <u>Non-Retainer General Services (Hourly Rate</u>). For all other routine general counsel services not included in the Meeting Retainer above, the work shall be billed at the following rates:

Attorney	Rate
Principal	\$300.00 per hour
Associates	\$267.00 per hour
Paralegal	\$129.00 per hour
Law Clerk	\$129.00 per hour

c. <u>Special Counsel Service and Cost Recovery Rates</u>. For non-routine special counsel services and for all legal work chargeable to third party applicants of the District, the work shall be billed at the non-retainer specialty rates maintained by the Firm, which range from \$275 to \$556 per hour. Before any special counsel services are provided, the District Counsel shall consult with the Manager/Engineer and the President of the Board of Directors.

d. <u>Annual Review of Rates</u>. District Counsel may request an annual review of the rates at the beginning of the District's fiscal year and seek adjustments. All rate adjustments shall be approved by the Board of Directors."

The remainder of Section 4 and the remainder of the Agreement will remain in full force and effect. This Amendment shall be effective on August 1, 2023.

27. <u>Board/District Counsel Communications</u>. Except for situations that require quick action, individual Board Members should generally communicate with District Counsel within the Board Meeting process. Outside of Board Meetings, communications by individual Board Members with District Counsel should be directed through the Board President, or the Vice President if the concern is in regards to the President.

Consider the draft policy, make desired amendments, and instruct staff to add the language to the Board Governance Manual.
